Affiliated Clubs Committee Report

Defining the duties of the Affiliated Club Committee (ACC) and Chair

The purpose of the Affiliated club is to promote the knowledge of the Icelandic Horse and its correct use as a competition and riding horse in accord with the policies of FEIF and the United States Icelandic Horse Congress. If the club's by-laws are revised at any time during the life of the club, they must be re-submitted for approval.

Duties of the Affiliated Club Committee Chair:

- Review applications of clubs seeking recognition as an Affiliated Club of the USIHC. Maintain records of required documents.
- 2. Review renewal applications of clubs seeking to maintain their status as an Affiliated Club of the USIHC. Renewal period begins the first of August and ends the last day of August of each year.
- 3. Maintain club member lists of each Affiliated Club, these lists are required of clubs renewing and applying for recognition as an Affiliated Club of the USIHC.
- 4. Assist in calculating the USIHC/regional club census for FEIF renewal documents (Fall of each year)
- 5. Oversee committee discussions and present any proposals to USIHC board of directors, act as liaison between the clubs and the board.
- 6. Oversee any programs dedicated to the Affiliated Clubs.
- 7. Review icelandic.org website pages dedicated to Affiliated Clubs on a Quarterly basis and submit any necessary changes or updates.
- 8. Keep the clubs informed of information from the board meetings.
- 9. Promote and facilitate club to club interactions.
- 10. Arbitrate any club to club issues, if needed.

Duties of the Affiliated Club Committee Members:

- 1. Encourage clubs to share ideas and discuss them in a constructive manner.
- 2. Encourage clubs to promote USIHC membership among their members.
- 3. Review club information on the icelandics.org website for accuracy on a quarterly basis, report any needed changes to ACC chair.
- 4. Share information back to your Affiliated Club, report any relevant feedback or comment back to this committee.

[#] Originally, the census number reported to FEIF only included USIHC members. In 2017, FEIF decided to allow countries to also count members who belonged to regional clubs, but not the USIHC. This counting method allowed the USIHC to increase their voting power in FEIF. However, it created a problem with how the USIHC was billed for World Fengur (basically we were being billed for the additional members, who because they were not USIHC members, had

no access to World Fengure). Therefore, in 2019, the Board (see BOD meeting minutes from 9/10/19) decided to report the number of USIHC members only to FEIF.

Regional Club Clinic Support - Policy #31, 2022

Summary of 2022 Clinics:

Four (of 13) Regional Clubs were able to hold clinics which were supported by Policy #31 funding in 2022. COVID, still affected many clubs ability to hold their group events. The USIHC paid out \$1000 of the \$3500 budgeted for this program. Each club was

eligible for one grant not to exceed \$250 in 2022 (grants were based on number of USIHC members in participation).

1. Alaska IHA: clinic in Wasilla, AK

2. Hestafolk: clinic in Lakewood, WA

3. NEIHC: clinic in Claverack, NY

4. Toppur: clinic in Truro, IA

Summary of 2021 Clinics:

Two (of 13) Regional Clubs were able to hold clinics which were supported by Policy #31 funding in 2021. COVID-19, still affected many clubs ability to hold their group events. The USIHC paid out \$500 of the \$3500 budgeted for this program. Each club was eligible for one grant not to exceed \$250 in 2021 (grants were based on number of USIHC members in participation).

Summary of 2020 Clinics:

One (of 13) Regional Clubs held a clinic supported by Policy #31 funding in 2020. Due to COVID-19, most clubs had to cancel their group events in 2020. The USIHC paid out \$250 of the \$3500 budgeted for this program. Each club was eligible for one \$250 grant in 2020. (No more than one grant/club was approved. Maximum of \$250.)

Summary of 2019 Clinics:

Ten (of 14) Regional Clubs held 10 clinics which were supported by Policy #31 funding in 2019. The USIHC paid out \$2275 of the \$3500 budgeted for this program. Each club was eligible for one \$250 grant in 2019. (No more than one grant/club was approved. Maximum of \$250.)

Summary of 2018 Clinics:

Ten (of 14) Regional Clubs held 10 clinics which were supported by Policy #31 funding in 2018. The USIHC paid out \$2500 of the \$3500 budgeted for this program. Each club was eligible for one \$250 grant in 2018. (No more than one grant/club was approved. Maximum of \$250.)

Summary of 2017 Clinics:

Ten (of 14) Regional Clubs held 17 clinics which were supported by Policy #31 funding in 2017. The USIHC paid out \$8500 of the \$12000 budgeted for this program. Each club was eligible for two \$500 grants in 2017. (No more than two grants/club were approved. Each at a maximum of \$500.)

Summary of 2016 Clinics:

Eight (of 12) Regional Clubs held 8 clinics which were supported by Policy #31 funding in 2016. The USIHC paid out \$4000 of the \$6000 budgeted for this program. Each club was eligible for one \$500 grant in 2016. (No more than one grant/club was approved. Each at a maximum of \$500.)

The committee's request to continue funding of Policy #31 for 2023 has been modified to encourage the use trainers and judges found listed on the USIHC website (icelandics.org). Funding of \$6500 has been requested, Budget meeting is set for February 7 2023

Promotion: Regional Clubs banner Update:

Promotions working in collaboration with AC committee was budgeted \$1960 in February 2020 (\$140/club, figuring 14 clubs) for creating banners to promote both the affiliated club and the USIHC. A Google form has been provided to each club to submit their request, files and information. To date, four clubs their banners.

Breeding Committee Report

There were two breeding events in the U.S. in 2022; one FEIF official assessment, and one educational event with FEIF judges. The official assessment took place August 30-31 at Harmony Icelandics in Truro, Iowa. Judges Silke Feuchthofen and William Flügge assessed five horses in total (2 official "full" assessments, one official conformation assessment, one full mock assessment, and one mock conformation assessment. After the second ridden assessment, William Flügge presented a seminar on conformation and movement.

The educational event took place at Montaire Icelandics in Middleburg, Virginia on May 21-22. Judges were Heimir Gunnarsson and Odinn Johannsson. Although no horses were officially assessed, 7 horses were presented for mock assessment. Heimir and Odinn used the opportunity to educate participants and observers about FEIF standards and scores. Thery showed videos and gave lectures. Everyone involved benefitted and enjoyed the experience.

In an effort to highlight quality stallions available for breeding in the U.S. the USIHC has created a Stallion Listing on the website. Stallion owners can advertise their breeding programs through their the farm listing. Pictures, scores, and a description of each horse are listed. Hopefully, this will help potential breeders.

Breeding chair Virginia Lauridsen wrote three articles for a *Focus on Breeding* series in the Quarterly. The first article discussed the pros and cons of breeding and important considerations for potential breeders. The second article discussed care of the mare and foal, and the third article discussed how to sell domestic-bred foals and the importance of quality breeding to the growth of the Icelandic breed in the U.S.

The breeding committee also began working on parameters for the use of Frozen semen in breeding. Andrea Barber is working on language to be added to the USIHC Policies and Procedures document.

The breeding manual created in 2021 was distributed to interested breeders throughout the year. It is still available on the website and hard copies are \$15. Anyone interested should contact the breeding chair at breeding@icelandics.org.

In 2023, there are three breeding events planned: a full assessment on May 13-14 at Montaire Icelandics in Middleburg, Virginia; a clinic with Olil Amble on "How to Ride a Breeding Assessment" on August 25-27 at Harmony Icelandics in Truro, Iowa and Young Horse and Foal Assessment in Colorado September 30-October 1 in Colorado. The breeding committee hopes that these events will encourage more domestic breeding. We now have many highly evaluated stallions and mares in the U.S., which could help raise the quality of domestic breeding. Well bred horses have a much better chance of good health, better movement, good temperament, and longer lives. We encourage anyone interested in breeding to join us in this endeavor.

Education Committee Report

2022 saw significant educational achievements throughout the USIHC. The education committee invested substantial time and effort in developing, thoroughly vetting, and putting in place a Fast-Track trainer certification program. The Fast-Track program sought to alleviate the significant geographical challenges we face in the United States to spend time working with other FEIF-certified trainers while at the same time maintaining very high standards to achieve a trainer certification. The first Fast-Track trainer certification testing took place this year at Harmony Icelandics in Iowa. Qualification for the Fast-Track program required a three-month (cumulative) internship with FEIF Level III trainer, along with fulfilling six of ten categories of qualifications. Candidates then needed to pass twelve exams (written, in-hand, lecture, gait, horse assessment, individual instruction, obstacles, dressage, oral, ponying, riding, group instruction, and longeing). Six candidates sat for the exams, and the USIHC is proud to announce that three candidates earned their FEIF Level I licensure.

Tamangur Icelandics also hosed the first in-person judging seminar in June in Larkspur, Colorado. Six candidates attended the FEIF Sport Judging Seminar, four candidates sat for the challenging examination, and two candidates earned their FEIF Sport A judging licenses. This is a significant gain for the USIHC, as it is the first time in years where multiple people earned their Sport A judging certification. We hope to see this reduce the costs and challenge in hosting sport events in the US going forward.

2023 looks to be a successful year for the education committee as well. USIHC President Virginia Lauridsen is hosting the 2023 Virtual Education Series with four separate online seminars in the fields of shoeing, confirmation, saddle fitting, and gaits.


Farm List: allows viewers to filter Farms based on State and Services. Each farm has their own Farm Profile that includes a short farm description, logo, location map, and contact information/website.

USIHC QUARTERLY COMMITTEE 2022 ANNUAL REPORT

In 2022 our 20 committee members produced four 52-page full-color issues of *The Icelandic Horse Quarterly*. As many as 50 contributors per issue provided the exceptional content and editorial oversight that makes the Quarterly such an effective "face" of the USIHC, as well as the advertising that helps us produce such a high-quality magazine.

Our committee membership itself is widely representative of Icelandic horse owners in the U.S. We have members from Maine to Alaska. We are professional writers and editors, photographers, illustrators, and graphic designers, but also horse trainers, a veterinarian, college professors, and business people. We are trail riders, competition riders, and breeders. Some of us have many horses, and some only one. Some are new to the breed, and some have over 25 years of experience with Icelandics. The only thing we don't have on the Quarterly committee are any men! We'd love to have you join us (male or female).

Please also continue to send us your stories and photos. You don't need to be a committee member to contribute to the Quarterly. And remember that we are always looking for "Wow!" photos for the cover.

In keeping with the USIHC mission statement, the Quarterly committee has three broad goals:

- to promote the knowledge of the Icelandic horse within the United States and its correct use as a competition and riding horse;
- to facilitate communication among all USIHC members;
- and to encourage Icelandic horse owners in the US to join the USIHC.

As one of our goals is to educate Icelandic horse owners, we focus on commissioning and printing stories about training (basics, groundwork, training methods, and fitness), stories highlighting the versatility of the Icelandic horse, and stories that promote the welfare of the horse. In 2022, we printed feature stories, for example, on:

- searching for and choosing your first Icelandic horse
- helping imported horses adjust
- the true cost of raising a foal
- the need for protein in a horse's diet
- summer eczema
- bone spavin
- equine massage
- the Hólar training pyramid
- showing a green horse
- eventing
- competitive trail riding
- endurance riding in the US and Iceland
- trekking in Iceland
- the blood mares controversy
- what horses teach us about ourselves
- the new USIHC trainer certification program
- trainers and judges
- books about Icelandic horses and horse training in general.

In keeping with our goal of providing a two-way communication channel for the Board, the Committees, the Affiliated Clubs, and the members, we dedicated 90 of the total pages printed in 2022 (208) to USIHC News and announcements, FEIF News, and Club News. Paid advertising accounted for another 50 pages, bringing in over \$8000 to offset the cost of publishing the magazine.

As last year, we printed 600 copies per quarter. Member households and magazine contributors received 525 copies in March, 541 in June, 526 in September, and 549 in December. (Please note that, while USIHC members in December resided in 604 households, some members choose to receive only the e-Quarterly). As the magazines are mailed at the most economical rate, printed copies were received by all members by the end of March, June, September, and December.

Youth Committee Report

USIHC Virtual Youth Show

In 2022, the USIHC hosted its first Virtual Youth Show with good attendance from our youth riders! We were pleased that this was a success and hope to continue to offer this excellent opportunity for our youth riders. We are excited to offer another Virtual Youth Show in 2023. The registration deadline will be July 28th with video submissions due August 4th. The show will offer the classes T1, T2, V1, F1, V6, and T8 for riders 18 years of age or younger. The show will follow the same rules and guidelines as the other USIHC Virtual Shows.

The USIHC plans to offer a Virtual Youth Show additionally in 2024 however plans to have the dates in accordance with the FEIF Youth Cup Tryouts which will take place in February 2024. This Youth Show/Tryout will allow for videos submitted to be filmed up to 6 months in advanced so that riders in cold weather areas are able to film before bad weather hits. Please plan accordingly if your youth rider would like to submit videos to the 2024 Virtual Youth Show/Tryout.

FEIF Youth Camp 2023

FEIF Youth Camp 2023 will be held in Finland on July 14th-17th, 2023. The FEIF Youth Camp is an international camp for young people who will TURN 14, 15, 16 or 17 years of age in the year of the FEIF Youth Camp. The camp is arranged every second year in one of the member countries of FEIF. The goal of the FEIF Youth Camp is to bring together young people from different countries who will improve their horsemanship skill and better understand cultural differences in our approaches to the horse. The common language of the Camp will be English. In order to take part in the FEIF Youth Camp, riders do not have to own (or bring) a horse, but they should be interested in Icelandics, and have some riding experience. Throughout the week a

challenging program – with and without horses – will be offered, aimed at fostering international friendship and raising standards of all aspects of horsemanship. For information about applying please contact youth@icelandics.org

Pen-pal Program

The Spaeri Youth Award

Spaeri is the Icelandic name of the Icelandic endurance horse known as Remington, famous for his determination, passion and indomitable will. This award is intended to inspire and encourage these same qualities in our youth when spending time with Icelandic Horses.

The Spaeri Award will be given annually to a youth who clearly demonstrates commitment to and love for Icelandic horses. The recipient of the award will be chosen from USIHC youth who submit articles demonstrating these sought after qualities for publication in the Quarterly during the calendar year. Articles will be reviewed at the end of the calendar year, and the Quarterly staff and Youth Committee will select one winner who will receive the award, along with \$50. How to Qualify:

A recipient must be a USIHC member under 18 years of age during the entire year the article is submitted. The recipient must submit a self-written article for publication in the Quarterly, along with a high resolution photograph of him/her and the horse or activity. To demonstrate the desired qualities, the article may describe any horse-related activity, such as trail or competition riding, driving, gymkhana, endurance, dressage, team penning, or jumping. Participation in non-riding activities such as 4-H, therapeutic riding, rescue and adoption, or simply training or caring for Icelandic horses, as long as the activity demonstrates love and commitment to the Icelandic horse. The youth writing the article need not own the Icelandic horse. Youth Articles for submission should be sent to quarterly@icelandics.org identified as a Youth Article submitted for the Spaeri Award. Submissions must be received by December 31 to be considered. The winner will be notified early in the following year and announced in the first issue of The Icelandic Horse Quarterly of the year.

North American Youth Cup 2023

The North American Youth Cup 2023 will be held at Montaire Icelandics in Middleburg, Virginia on July 10th-16th, 2023. This will be the fourth North American Youth Cup held and is a wonderful opportunity for youth Icelandic horse enthusiasts. The application includes a riding video, a written application and two reference letters. Twenty participants will be selected to participate and upon arrival will be placed in four teams. Throughout the week, the teams will work together and take lessons from four trainers in preparation for the weekend competition. Participants will connect and form strong bonds with other youth riders dedicated to Icelandic horses. Applications will be due April 1st and results announced April 15th.
